SPECIAL NOTE: This worksheet is to enable you to chart your progress toward your chosen degree and does not constitute official policy regarding graduation requirements. For the official statement of requirements, consult the appropriate catalog. In case of a discrepancy between the worksheet and the catalog, you must follow the catalog's requirements. Your faculty advisor and departmental staff try to provide accurate information concerning your academic program. However, you are personally responsible for knowing and following all catalog requirements and regulations affecting your program.

How To Use This Sheet: On the reverse of this sheet are the requirements you must fulfill to receive the BS in Public Administration using the Fall 2001 through Spring 2005 catalogs. The faculty recommends taking electives only after the specific requirements for general education and the major have been fulfilled. Electives are any courses which complete the requirements for 45 hours of upper level courses and/or 120 total hours. If in doubt, consult your faculty advisor or the department. Do not enroll in a course unless you are sure it will satisfy your degree requirements.

General Requirements: 120 credit hours are required for the degree, of which 45 must be numbered 300 or above. All GOVT courses used for the major, major supporting courses and courses for Option A or B must be passed with a "C" or better. A cumulative GPA of 2.0 is required for graduation.

Transfer Students: If you have an AA, AS or AA&S degree from VCCS you meet the university and college general education requirements except for ENGL 302 and a Synthesis course. Students with a VCCS AA, AS or AA&S degree must complete one Quantitative Reasoning course at George Mason. Please be sure that the Admissions Office has received an official transcript showing your VCCS AA, AS or AA&S degree.

Minors: It is possible to combine a major in Public Administration with a minor in American Government, International and Comparative Politics, Public Policy and Management or Legal Studies. However, at least 8 credits must be unique for each minor. This rule also applies to other minors, which use courses that are applied to the Public Administration major.

Notes:

- (1) The Quantitative Reasoning requirement is fulfilled by taking 2 courses from the list on the front. Appropriate Math placement test score may be required before enrolling. One of the Quantitative Reasoning courses meets a university general education requirement, and can be passed with a D or better. The second course meets a major requirement, and needs to be passed with a C or better. VCCS transfer students see note above.
- (2) A two-semester sequence in the same lab science (e.g. Biology) is required to complete the Natural Science Requirement.
- (3) ACCT 203, ACCT 361, GOVT 343, GOVT 358 and GOVT 464 may apply to only one major requirement.
- (4) The Foreign Language requirement for Option B is fulfilled by demonstration of competency through the intermediate level (i.e. by completion of 202), or a placement test administered by the Department of Modern and Classical Languages, or through waiver for students whose native language is not English.
- (5) All PHED, all activity classes in PRLS, and MLSC courses below the 400-level cannot be counted toward the degree requirements in the College of Liberal Arts and Human Sciences. They award 0 credits toward the 120 required credits.
